I. Catalog Description

Introduces the concepts and techniques of basic single-camera production necessary to prepare for editing and presentation of short films in a computer-assisted digital video environment.

Prerequisites: COMM 1336 and COMM 2339. (3:0).

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- A. Determine pre- and post-production needs in scripting for various film genres.
- B. Utilize script formatting and storyboarding techniques.
- C. Effectively operate various types of microphones, cameras, and accessories.
- D. Assemble and operate audio and video field equipment for cinematic production.
- E. Record audio and video in a variety of locations and sets.
- F. Set up lights for video recording in studio, indoors, and in the field.
- G. Edit audio and video portions leading to a student's final work being judged as having cinematic presentation quality, with audio and video editing skills evident.
