I. Catalog Description

Continues experience in aural recognition of tone relations through sight-singing and keyboard activities.
Prerequisite: MUSI 1116. Corequisite: MUSI 1312. (1:1).

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course the student will be able to:

- A. Sing major and minor scales, intervals, and simple melodies at first reading.
- B. Recognize major and minor scales, intervals, major and minor chords, diminished and augmented chords, chord progressions, and major and minor keys by ear.
- C. Notate one-part dictation accurately in pitch with the proper rhythmic values.

III. Evaluation

- A. Tests and quizzes will be given to determine the student's progress and understanding of the course material. A minimum of three tests, a final exam, and three quizzes will be administered.
- B. To determine the student's final grade, the instructor will average test and quiz scores. Grades will be based on the following scale:

90 to 100 = A
80 to 89 = B
70 to 79 = C
60 to 69 = D
below 60 = F

- C. Attendance requirements will be specified by instructor and may be a factor in determining the final grade.
