I. Catalog Description

Provides an introduction to object-oriented Java programming including the fundamental syntax and semantics of Java for applications and web applets. **Prerequisite: ITSE1329.** (3:1).

- G. Use arrays in Java.
- H. Write programs that use simple graphic design elements.
- I. Manipulate graphic elements using the graphics coordinate system.
- J. Apply event-driven programming techniques.
- K. Write to an Application Programming Interface (API).
- L. Develop user interfaces using the Abstract Windowing Toolkit (AWT).
- M. Create data structures.
- N. Demonstrate the use of stream I/O.
