I. Catalog Description

Introduces the elements of music, including study of the staff, clefs, key signatures, scales, time signatures, notation, meter and rhythm, sight-singing, major and minor chords, application of theory at the keyboard, and rhythmic, melodic, and harmonic ear training. Open to all students. **(3:0)**.

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course the student will be able to:

- A. Explain and use the basic components of music: notation, rhythm, melody, harmony, major and minor scales, chords and key signatures.
- B. Use the keyboard to translate written notes into aural pitches.
- C. Begin to recognize intervals, major and minor chords, diminished and augmented chords and major and minor keys by ear.

III. Evaluation

- A. Tests will be given at the end of chapters 2, 4, 6 and 8 of the textbook, and a final exam at the end of the course. Each test will have two parts, a paper and pencil test and a keyboard performance test.
- B. Scores on the tests and the final exam will be averaged to find the percent score for the course. Percent scores will be converted to letter grades according to the following scale:

90 to 100	=A
80 to 89	=B
70 to 79	=C
60 to 69	=D
below 60	=F
