### I. Catalog Description

Reviews and applies skills in listening comprehension, speaking, reading, and writing. Emphasizes conversation, vocabulary acquisition, reading, composition, and culture. **Prerequisite: FREN 1412 (3:0).**

### II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the students will be able to:

- A. Demonstrate communicative competencies through on-going opportunities for oral practice in cultural and literary contexts.
- B. Demonstrate appreciation of literature through oral discussions of reading selections.
- C. Demonstrate familiarity with the contemporary cultures from the French-speaking countries and expand the students' ability to make cross-cultural comparisons.
- D. Demonstrate reading and understanding of authentic texts from the French-speaking world and to articulate their observations, reactions and opinions.

### III. Evaluation

- A. Pre-assessment  
Instructors should check each student's prerequisites (including Placement Exam results) the first day of class; those who do not qualify should be sent back to admissions.
- B. Challenge Exams  
Students who wish to challenge the course should contact the Testing Center and the Foreign Languages Coordinator. Challenges must be accomplished before the census cut-off date. Students who previously have received a letter grade for the course are not eligible to challenge the course.
- C. Post-assessment  
The instructor will maintain a continuous record of each student's progress on an institutionally approved grade sheet or computerized substitute. All instructors must keep records in such a way that information would be clear to a second party having to check grade computation in special cases. An explanatory legend should be provided on the grade sheet. The evaluation of the exam should be based on the student's mastery of the assigned objectives. In addition to the readings, verb tenses, vocabulary and spelling, it is essential that the instructor require writing assignments throughout the semester. The instructor may also require a journal or free writing assignments.

1. Final Examinations  
A final examination is required.
2. Grading Percentages  
Grade percentages for determining the course grade may be devised by the individual instructor.
3. Retakes and Make-up Exams and Class Assignments.  
At the instructor's discretion, students may be allowed to rewrite papers or retest for higher grades.
