I. Catalog Description

Surveys the major psychological topics, theories and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. **Prerequisite: INRW 0311 or ESOL 0340 (can be taken concurrently) or by placement exam or ENGL 1301 with a “C” or better or ENGL 1302 with a “C” or better. (3:0).**

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- A. Describe the methodology of basic behavioral scientific research.
- B. Describe the biological, intellectual, and social changes that occur across the human life span.
- C. Describe the process by which sensory information is received, analyzed and integrated into existing mental content.
- D. Explain paradigms of learning and memory.
- E. Discuss cognitive functioning.
- F. Discuss the motivational variables that contribute to human behavior and the emotional responses that result.
- G. Describe theories of healthy and unhealthy personality development and psychological interventions.
- H. Discuss the dynamics of gender and human sexuality.
- I. Discuss the dynamics of human behavior in groups to include such concepts as conformity, prejudice, aggression, and effects on crowding.
- J. Apply one’s knowledge of psychology to more objectively evaluate human behavior.
- K. Demonstrate effective written, oral, and/or visual **communication skills**.
- L. Engage in **critical thinking skills**, creative thinking, innovation, and inquiry, and demonstrate analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- M. Demonstrate **empirical and quantitative skills** the ability to formulate an inquiry and then identify and follow an investigative process using empirical and/or qualitative/quantitative reasoning to satisfy the inquiry.
- N. Demonstrate **social responsibility skills** intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and/or the ability to engage effectively in local, regional, national, and/or global communities.

III. THECB Learning Outcomes (ACGM)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Identify various research methods and their characteristics used in the scientific study of psychology.
2. Describe the historical influences and early schools of thought that shaped the field of psychology.
3. Describe some of the prominent perspectives and approaches used in the study of psychology.
4. Use terminology unique to the study of psychology.
5. Describe accepted approaches and standards in psychological assessment and evaluation.
6. Identify factors in physiological and psychological processes involved in human behavior.
