I. Catalog Description

Provides a chronological analysis of the historical and cultural contexts of painting, sculpture, architecture, and related visual arts from the 14th century to the present day. **Prerequisite: INRW 0311 or ESOL 0340 (can be taken concurrently) or by placement exam or ENGL 1301 with a “C” or better or ENGL 1302 with a “C” or better. (3:0).**

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- A. Use **critical thinking skills** to explain and interpret the relationship of art to human experience through the visual language of art.
- B. Categorize and identify artistic movements according to their historic and social significance.
- C. Utilize visual and written **communication skills** to express an understanding of art creations spanning the Renaissance through Modern art to include a broad range of art from the utilitarian to art as a function of community, religion, and political power.
- D. Recognize the **social responsibility** of art within regional, national, and global societies.
- E. Discuss the visual record of art as a reflection of the **personal responsibility** of artists to express the philosophical and cultural achievements of humanity through a historic and social context.

III. THECB Learning Outcomes (ACGM)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Identify and describe works of art based on their chronology and style, using standard categories and terminology.
2. Investigate major artistic developments and significant works of art from the 14th century to the present day.
3. Analyze the relationship of art to history by placing works of art within cultural, historical, and chronological contexts.
4. Critically interpret and evaluate works of art.
