I. Catalog Description

Provides an introduction to the fundamental terminology, concepts, theory, and application of two-dimensional design. Emphasizes experimentation and practices in basic design projects using visual communication techniques and creative problem-solving. **(2:4). Lab fee.**

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- A. Visually recognize and communicate an understanding of the elements of visual language.
- B. Visually communicate an understanding of the principles of color and value.
- C. Effectively utilize assigned materials for two-dimensional compositions.
- D. Understand how the visual elements of art can be used to effectively relate ideas to social issues within a community.
- E. Use critical thinking skills to evaluate visual content in a group and/or individual classroom setting.

III. THECB Learning Outcomes (ACGM)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Identify and apply the elements of art and principles of two-dimensional design.
- 2. Employ discipline specific vocabulary in the evaluation of two-dimensional design problems.
- 3. Demonstrate creative skill in aesthetic problem solving within assigned parameters.
- 4. Demonstrate an appropriate level of professional practice, including safety, craft and presentation.
