### I. Catalog Description

Provides an introduction to object-oriented Java programming including the fundamental syntax and semantics of Java for applications and web applets. **Prerequisite: ITSE1329. (3:1).**

### II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the student will be able to

- A. Explain the concepts of platform independent programming and the Java Virtual Machine.
- B. Differentiate between various Java data types
- C. Design Java programs using object oriented programming techniques.
- D. Create Java classes and objects.
- E. Use the Java class library.
- F. Program in Java using loops and decisions.
- G. Use arrays in Java.
- H. Write programs that use simple graphic design elements.
- I. Manipulate graphic elements using the graphics coordinate system.
- J. Apply event-driven programming techniques.
- K. Write to an Application Programming Interface (API).
- L. Develop user interfaces using the Abstract Windowing Toolkit (AWT).
- M. Create data structures.
- N. Demonstrate the use of stream I/O.

Design and write documented Java applications and applets.
