I. Catalog Description

Provides an instructional program designed to integrate on-campus study with practical hands-on experience in *Abnormal* psychology. In conjunction with class seminars/*lectures*, the individual student will set specific goals and objectives in the *clinical* study of *normal vs. abnormal* human social behavior and/or social institutions. Provides the definitions and history of abnormal behavior. Provides an examination of the various psychological disorders as well as theoretical, clinical, and experimental perspectives of the study of psychopathology. Emphasizes terminology, classification, etiology, assessment, and treatment of the major psychological disorders. Upon completion, students should be able to distinguish between normal and abnormal behavior patterns as well as demonstrate knowledge of etiology, symptoms, and therapeutic techniques. **Prerequisite: PSYC 2301. (3:0).**

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Define abnormal behavior and explain the rationale behind it.
- Compare, contrast, and integrate biological, psychological, and sociocultural explanations of abnormal behavior.
- Explain the nature of stress and people's reactions to it.
- Discuss the role of psychological and behavioral factors in the causation of physical problems.
- Describe symptoms of various mental disorders.
- Describe the main factors thought to be involved in the causation of the mental disorders discussed in the text.
- Identify treatments for mental disorders and compare their efficacy in treating such disorders.
- Discuss efforts to prevent psychopathology, giving examples of prevention programs.
- Apply, to selected case examples, what you have learned about the conceptualization, causation, and treatment of mental disorders.

III. THECB Learning Outcomes (ACGM)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to identify:

- A. The fundamental definitions of abnormal behavior.
- B. The format and underlying logic of the DSM – 5 diagnostic and classification system.
- C. Defining features/symptoms/characteristics of major DSM – 5 disorders.
- D. The causes of selected disorders according to the leading theoretical models.
- E. Methods of treatment, intervention, and assessment of psychological disorders.
- F. Role of the scientific method in understanding and treating psychological disorders.

IV. Evaluation
