I. Catalog Description

Provides practical, general workplace training supported by an individualized learning plan developed by the employer, college, and student. Allows the student a supervised introduction to the professional role of the vocational nurse as a provider of patient-centered care, member of the health care team, patient safety advocate, and member of the profession. Students must pass VNSG 2214 and VNSG 1163 with a grade of "C" or better to take this course. A grade of "C" or better is required in this course to take the next course. **Corequisites: VNSG 1163 and VNSG 2214. (0:7). Professional Practice Insurance required.**

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of these units, the student will be able to:

A. Unit I. Nurse as a Provider of Patient-Centered Care

1. Assist in determining the health status and health needs of adult medical-surgical patients based upon interpretation of health-related data and preventive health practices in collaboration with patients, their families, and other members of the immediate health care team. **(SLO #5)**
2. Assist in the formulation of goals/outcomes and a plan of care for adult medical-surgical patients in collaboration with patients, their families, and interdisciplinary health care team members. **(SLO #1, 5)**
3. Implement plan of care within legal and ethical parameters, including scope of education, for adult medical-surgical patients in collaboration with patients and interdisciplinary health care team to assist patient in meeting health care needs. **(SLO #3, 4)**
4. Implement teaching plan for adult medical-surgical patients with common health problems and well defined learning needs. **(SLO #1)**
5. Assist in the evaluation of adult medical-surgical clients' responses and outcomes to therapeutic interventions. **(SLO #4, 5)**

6. Provide direct basic care to multiple assigned adult medical-surgical patients (no more than five at a time) in structured settings. **(SLO #5)**
7. Use the problem-solving approach as the basis for decision making in nursing practice. **(SLO #5)**
8. Demonstrate the ability to use the nursing process. **(SLO #4)**
9. Apply critical thinking skills at an entry vocational nurse level. **(SLO #2, 5)**

B. Unit II. Nurse as a Member of the Health Care Team

1. Assist in the coordination of human and material resources for the provision of care for assigned adult medical-surgical patients. **(SLO #5)**
2. Collaborate with adult medical-surgical patients and the interdisciplinary health care team to provide direct care to assigned individual patients **(SLO #5)**
3. Participate in the identification of adult medical-surgical patients' needs for referrals that facilitate continuity of care. **(SLO #1, 5)**
4. Participate in activities which support the organizational framework of structured health care settings as a VN student. **(SLO #3, 4)**
5. Demonstrate ways that the vocational nurse can develop insights through reflection, self-analysis and planning for self-care when working with the adult patients/clients. **(SLO 3, 4)**

C. Unit III. Nurse as a Member of the Profession

1. Demonstrate accountability for own nursing practice with adult medical-surgical patients. **(SLO #3, 4)**
2. Participate as an advocate in activities that focus on improving the health care of adult medical-surgical patients. **(SLO #5)**
3. Demonstrate behaviors that promote the development and practice of vocational nursing. **(SLO #3, 4)**

D. Unit IV. Nurse as a Patient Safety Advocate

1. Utilize the Texas Nursing Practice Act and the Texas Board of Nursing Rules that emphasis safety in regards to the vocational nurse delivering patient centered care to the adult patient. **(SLO #3, 4)**
2. Apply the Federal, State and Local governments and accreditation organization safety requirements and standards in regards to the vocational nurse delivering patient centered care to the adult patient. **(SLO 2, 3)**
3. Demonstrate measures that the vocational nurse would use to promote quality patient centered care and safe environment in the adult health care settings. **(SLO #2, 4)**
4. Explore the vocational nurse role and responsibilities with the adult patient during a disaster and a bioterrorism incident. **(SLO #4, 5)**

E. Unit V. Laboratory Skills

Demonstrate the skills utilized in the care of medical-surgical patients. This also includes fluids, medications, calories, and calculations as appropriate. **(SLO #4)**

III. Student Learning Outcomes (SLO's): VOCATIONAL NURSING

Nursing Program Student Learning Outcomes (SLO's) assess the knowledge, skills/abilities, and/or attitudes that display behavioral evidence which the students have attained from their educational experiences. The ongoing assessment of Student Learning Outcomes is specifically linked to the El Paso Community College Mission Statement, Institutional Strategic Goals, Program Review, and the Nursing Mission and Vision statement. Nursing Program Student Learning Outcomes specifically describe the end result of the Nursing program.

1.	Integrate teaching-learning principles by developing, presenting, evaluating and modifying teaching plans to meet the needs of patients and their families.
2.	Utilize nursing -clinical judgment, communication skills and a systematic process when advocating for safe caring and compassionate patient-centered care to culturally diverse patients and their families across the lifespan in a variety of health care settings.
3.	Assume accountability for the quality of patient-centered nursing care within the legal scope of nursing practice consistent with ethical principles and professional values and standards.
4.	Provide evidence-based nursing care that promotes safety for the patient, family and their environment, while utilizing current technologies and nursing informatics.
5.	Collaborate and co-ordinate with patients, their families and the interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary health care team to implement best practices and to address health promotion and disease prevention, health maintenance and health restoration based on the individual's perception of their health needs.

IV. THECB Learning Outcomes (WECM)

As outlined in the learning plan, apply the theory, concepts, and skills involving specialized materials, tools, equipment, procedures, regulations, laws, and interactions within and among political, economic, environmental, social, and legal systems associated with the occupation and the business/industry and will demonstrate legal and ethical behavior, safety practices, interpersonal and teamwork skills, and appropriate written and verbal communication skills using the terminology of the occupation and the business/industry.

V. Evaluation

Proficiency Exams: Any student wishing to do a proficiency exam for a nursing course should speak to the VN Program Coordinator and/or to the Nursing Counselor. All nursing courses in the vocational nurse program can be challenged if available, but the student must meet residency requirements and have 6 vocational nursing hours at El Paso Community College to be a graduate of the EPCC Vocational Nurse Program.

Articulation: Articulation plans for the vocational nursing program are available and will be addressed by the nursing counselor.

A. Pre-clinical drug calculation Assessment

Mastery of drug calculations must be demonstrated for all nursing clinical courses. A score of 90% or higher on a pre-clinical drug calculation assessment examination must be received. Students must receive the 90% score prior to administering medications in the clinical setting. This applies to all students taking or auditing a theory or a clinical course to include the first semester. This will validate their knowledge and skills as they prepare to advance to the next course and provide an opportunity for remediation, if appropriate. The first attempt at the calculation examination/math test will be counted as a theory quiz. A 10-point deduction from the A.D.N./VN Competencies (clinical evaluation) for each day that medications cannot be administered plus other areas as applicable. The Math exam will be offered once weekly.

B. Remediation

Students who do not pass the VN competencies, nursing care plans, and client teaching plans will receive a counseling form with recommendations for improvement. Failure to meet the stated recommendations will place the student in jeopardy of failing the course.

If the student fails the course, the student will receive a counseling form and/or student data exit form with recommendations for improvement so that the student can be successful. The student will need to apply to the Applicant Review Committee for the nursing department. *See Nursing Student Handbook.

C. Grading Criteria

The student must obtain a minimum grade of 78% in this course for successful completion. In addition, the average of the three clinical competency grades must yield a minimum score of "78." Anything less than 78% on the averaged competencies will result in failure of the course.

The following grading scale will be utilized:

A	=	90 - 100
B	=	80 - 89
C	=	78 - 79
D	=	77 - 70
F	=	0 - 69

1. Scores on each examination, assignment or clinical evaluation will be rounded and recorded to the closest whole number.

2. Final Course grades will NOT be rounded to the closest whole number. A 78.00% is needed to pass the course with no rounding (i.e. 77.7 would be recorded as 77.7 and not rounded up to 78; 89.9 stays 89.9 and would not be rounded up to 90).

3. Rounding rule: All grades except for Final Course Grade, NO rounding with Final Course Grade.

- a. To determine scores to record, use the value in the tenths column only do not carry out any further. (82.459 would be recorded as 82 because only the tenths column is looked at).
- b. 0.5 and above will be rounded to the next higher whole number (i.e., 84.6 becomes 85).
- c. 0.4 and below will be rounded by dropping the tenths and leaving the whole number (i.e., 84.3 becomes 84).
