I. Catalog Description

Provides a general introduction to the visual arts designed to create an appreciation of the vocabulary, media, techniques, and purpose of the creative process. Students will critically interpret and evaluate works of art within cultural contexts. Course includes historical overviews of the visual arts. **Prerequisite: INRW 0311 or ESOL 0340 (can be taken concurrently) or by placement exam or ENGL 1301 with a "C" or better or ENGL 1302 with a "C" or better. (3:0).**

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- A. Apply **critical thinking skills** towards an awareness of the historic relevance of art and its implications for the future.
- B. Employ visual, oral and written **communication skills** in expressing comprehension of art through a variety of lessons and approaches.
- C. Engage with other students, applying **teamwork skills** towards a greater understanding of a variety of artists, styles and forms of expression in the visual arts.
- D. Cultivate **social responsibility skills** through the recognition of the role of art in shaping societies.
- E. Develop an appreciation for the relevance of the visual arts in student's personal life.

III. THECB Learning Outcomes (ACGM)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Apply art terminology as it specifically relates to works of art.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of art elements and principles of design.
- 3. Differentiate between the processes and materials used in the production of various works of art.
- 4. Critically interpret and evaluate works of art.
- 5. Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of arts on culture.
