I. Catalog Description

Presents cultural, historical, and aesthetic aspects of dance through lectures, videos, and demonstrations. Discusses ethnic, classical, and contemporary dance and its interrelationship with cultural developments and other art forms. **Prerequisite: INRW 0311 or ESOL 0340 (can be taken concurrently) or by placement exam or ENGL 1301 with a “C” or better or ENGL 1302 with a “C” or better. (3:0).**

II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- A. Compare and contrast people, traditions, and trends of several cross-cultural dance forms throughout history. Engage in **social responsibility skills** by demonstrating intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and/or the ability to engage effectively in local, regional, national, and/or global communities.
- B. Critique dance performances using appropriate vocabulary and concepts about theme, time, space, and energy/dynamics. Demonstrate effective written, oral, and/or visual **communication skills**.
- C. Apply their descriptive, interpretive, and evaluative skills to the creation of creative and written responses of a variety of dance concerts (live and videotaped). Demonstrate **critical thinking skills** by engaging in creative thinking, innovation, and inquiry and demonstrate analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- D. Differentiate and explain the function and context of different styles of dance. Demonstrate **teamwork skills** with the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.

III. Learning Outcomes (ACGM)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Identify various forms of dance.
2. Articulate the relationship between dances and the historical and cultural contexts from which they emerged.
3. Express an informed personal reaction to dance forms.
4. Critically analyze and write about dance using established methods of dance criticism.
5. Evaluate the impact of dance on culture.

IV. Evaluation

Evaluation Criteria include the following:

- A. Attendance and participation are essential in this course and will affect the student's final grade. A grading system for attendance and participation will be devised by the individual instructor.
- B. Students will complete written activities related to dance. These may include descriptive essays, written dance critiques, stylistic comparisons, and/or other activities.
- C. Students will be evaluated on short written quizzes, in-class projects, written exams, and/or other exercises.
