I. Catalog Description

Studies computer information systems security monitoring, intrusion detection, and crisis management. Includes alarm management, signature configuration, sensor configuration, and troubleshooting components. Emphasizes identifying, resolving, and documenting network crises and activating the response team. **(3:1). Lab fee.**

- Install and manage a secure communication link between all sensors and the monitor.
- Install and manage event database(s).
- Analyze an event and trends.

- Deploy, implement, and test IDS security plan.
