I. Catalog Description

Studies human development from adolescence through late adulthood and death and dying. Focuses on physical, cognitive and psychological changes, areas of interpersonal relationships, and the individual's ability to relate to the social environment. **(3:0)**.

II. Course Objectives

4. Discuss the impact of cultural factors in this stage of developments.

C. Unit III: Middle Adulthood

1. Describe the physical development of middle adulthood.
2. Describe the cognitive development of late adulthood.
3. Describe the psychosocial development of late adulthood.
4. Discuss the impact of cultural factors in this stage of developments.

D. Unit IV: Late Adulthood

1. Describe the physical development of late adulthood.

2. Describe the cognitive development of late adulthood.
3. Describe the psychosocial development of late adulthood.
4. Discuss the impact of cultural factors in this stage of developments.

III. Evaluation

The course may be taught using a combination of lecture, class discussion, in-group exercises, videos, and guest speakers. The instructor may place articles on reserve at the Library for students to read. Additional handouts and materials will be provided by the instructor.

Activities

Evaluation activities will be established by each individual teaching a course in the Social Work Program. Instructors will choose those evaluation methods she/he determines as most appropriate for the particular course she/he is teaching. Evaluation methods may include, but are not limited to: written exams, individual or group projects, demonstrations, oral presentation, a written journal, quizzes, or written assignments.
