### I. Catalog Description

A survey of the political, social, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of Texas from the pre-Columbian era to the present. Themes that may be addressed in Texas History include: Spanish colonization and Spanish Texas; Mexican Texas; the Republic of Texas; statehood and secession; oil, industrialization, and urbanization; civil rights; and modern Texas. **Prerequisite: Placement at college-level English Language Arts Reading by TSIA2 or equivalent; OR completion of INRW 0311 or INRW 0312 or ESOL 0340 with a "C" or better. (3:0).**

### II. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- A. Analyze areas/cultures of Native American settlement in Texas.
- B. Discuss the arrival of the Europeans and areas of settlement.
- C. Examine the evolution of the Far Northwestern Spanish frontier.
- D. Discuss developments in the late 18th-early 19th Centuries that brought about independence from Spain.
- E. Describe Texas under Mexican rule and the process of Texas independence from Mexico.
- F. Analyze the political and economic history of the Republic of Texas.
- G. Discuss the process of Texas annexation and statehood.
- H. Explain the causes and history of the War with Mexico, 1846-48.
- I. Analyze developments in the United States of the 1850s that led to the Civil War.
- J. Describe the developments in Texas' secession from the Union.
- K. Examine the Civil War in Texas.
- L. Discuss Reconstruction and its effects on Texas.

- M. Examine the struggle on the Texas frontier.
- N. Describe late 19th Century developments in Texas.
- O. Analyze the impact of Progressive Reform in Texas.
- P. Discuss Texas in the early Twentieth Century.
- Q. Explain the impact of the Great Depression in Texas.
- R. Examine Texas at mid-Twentieth Century.
- S. Explain social, political, economic developments in Texas since the Second World War.
- T. Discuss Texas at the end of the Twentieth Century.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.
2. Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
3. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on Texas history.

Due to the nature of history there is no challenge exam for the course. A reading test can be given to determine preparedness of students. Individual instructors may use a unit pre-assessment at their own discretion. Note will be made of this in their personal syllabi.
