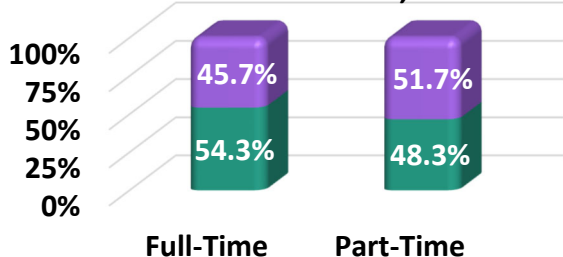

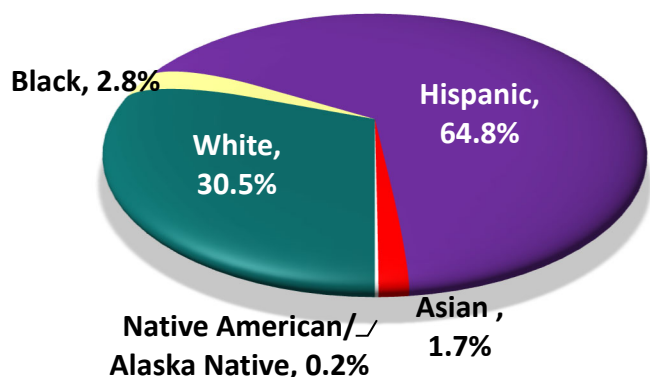
EPCC Faculty by Full and Part-Time Status and Gender, Fall 2019

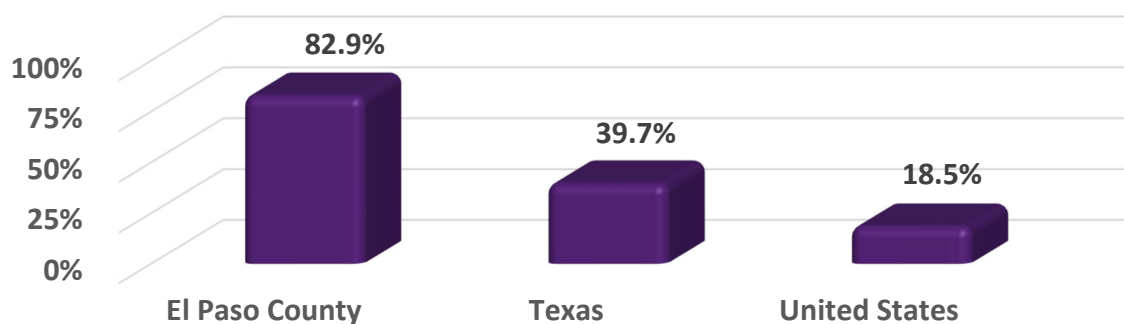

Total Hispanic Population as of July 1, 2019



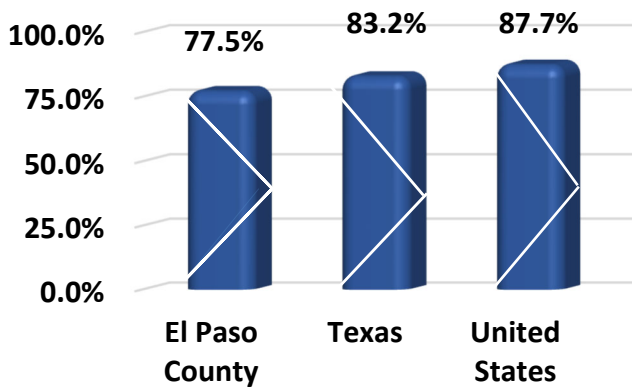

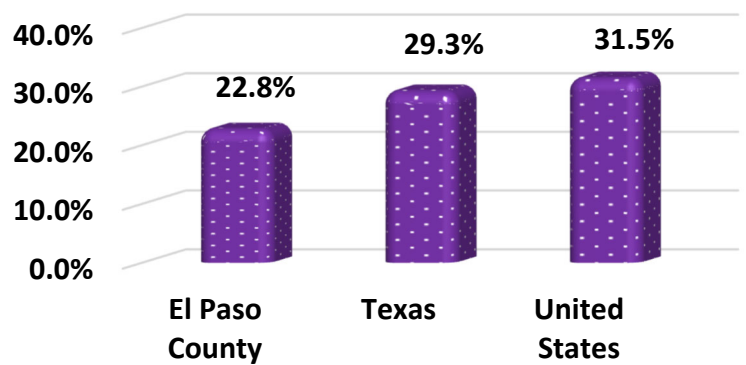

Percent of Persons 25 Years and Older with Bachelor's Degree or Higher, 2014-2018

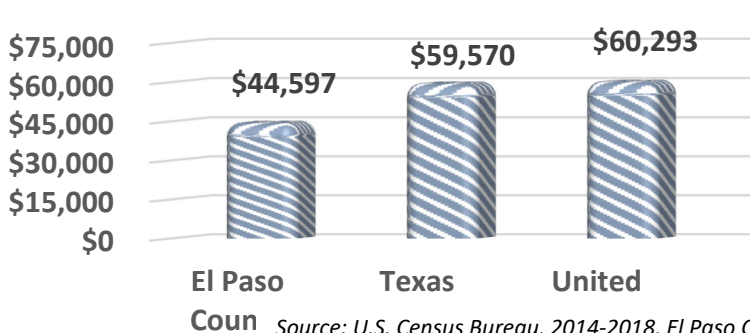

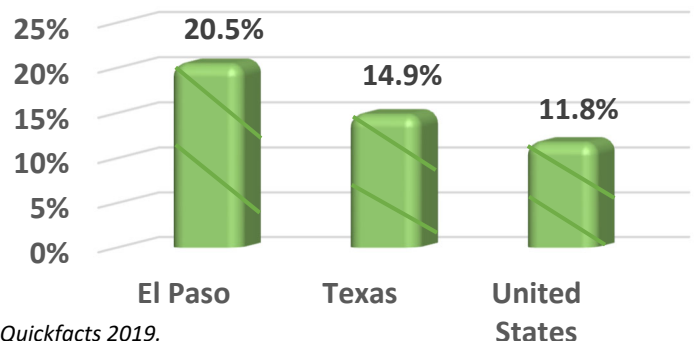

Persons in poverty, 2014-2018



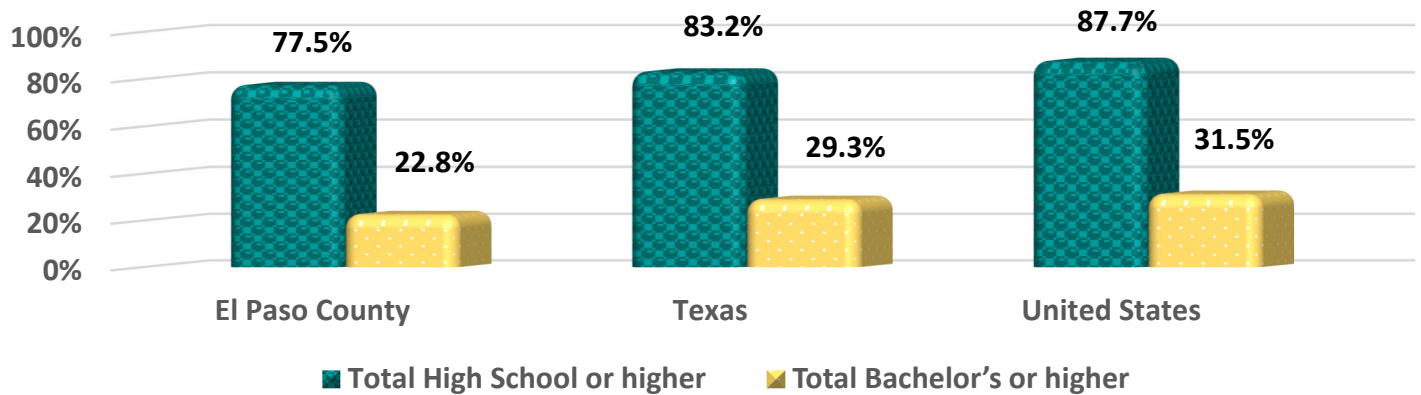

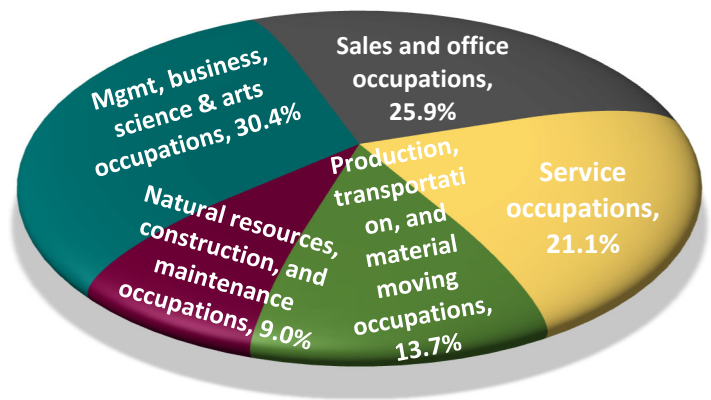

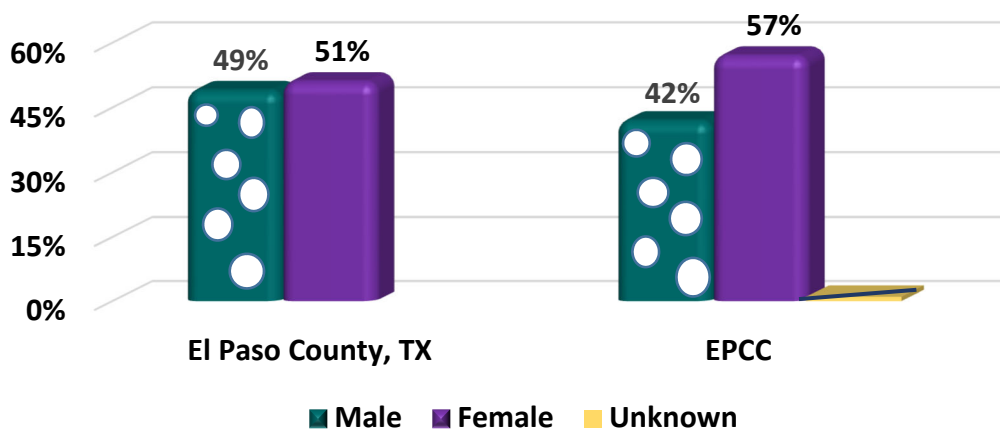

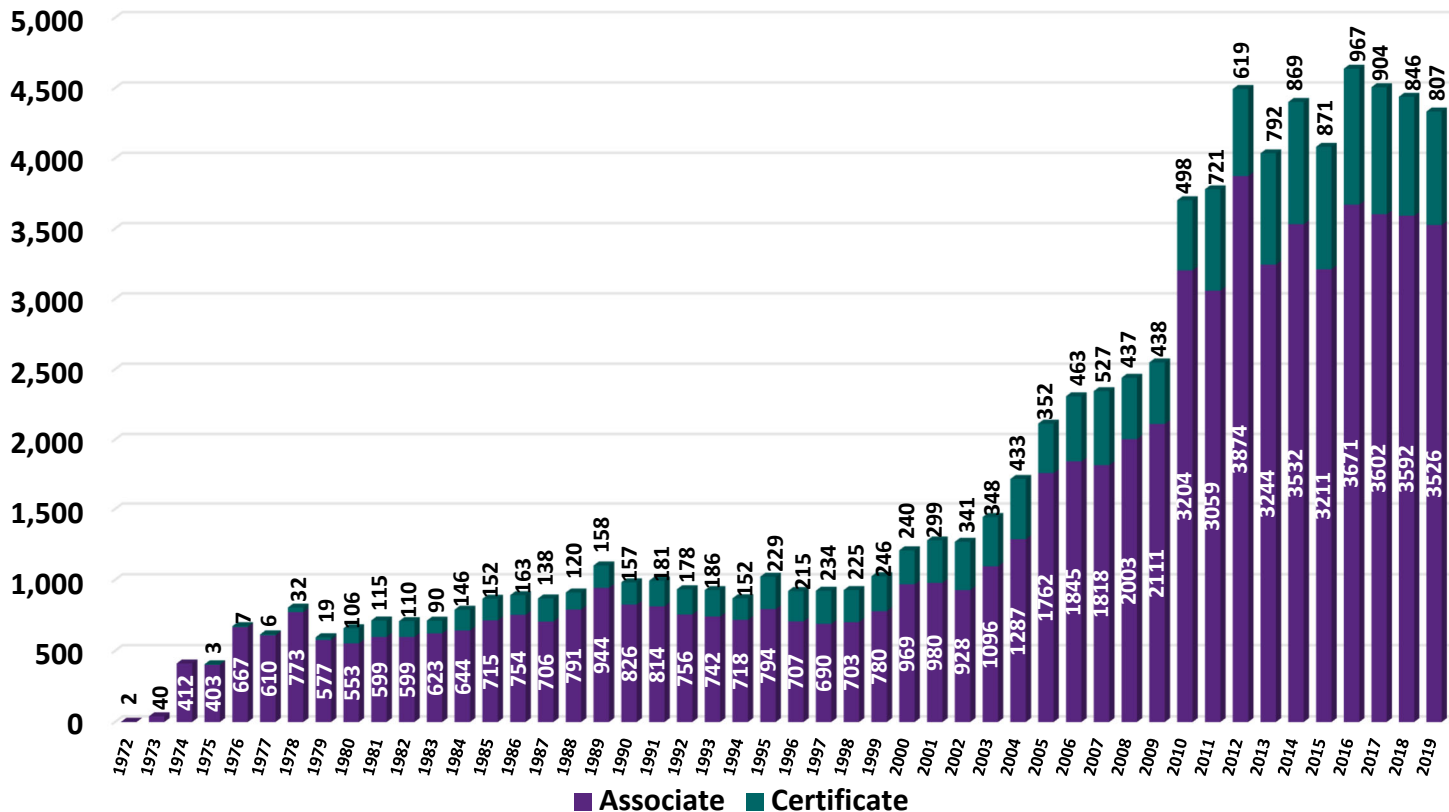

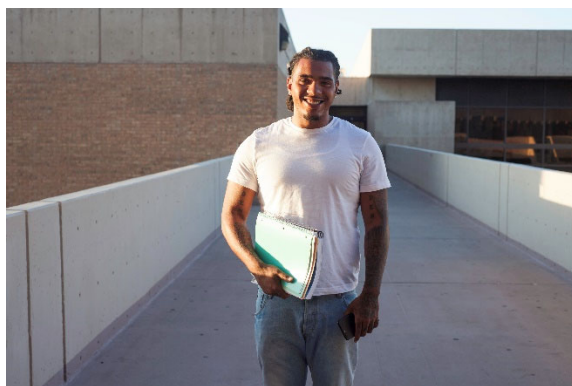


Degrees and Certificates Awarded, 1972-2019

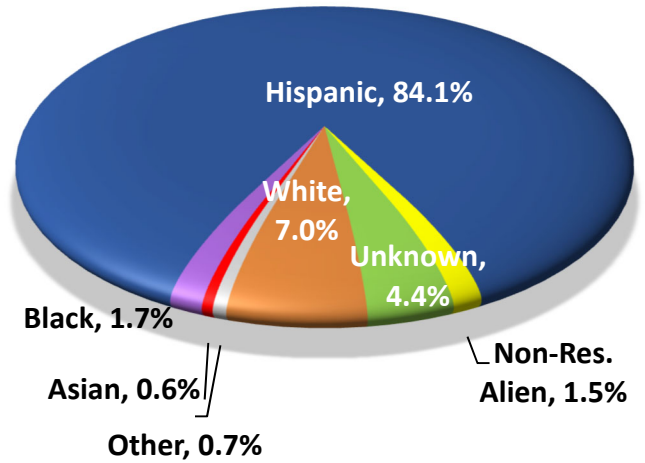

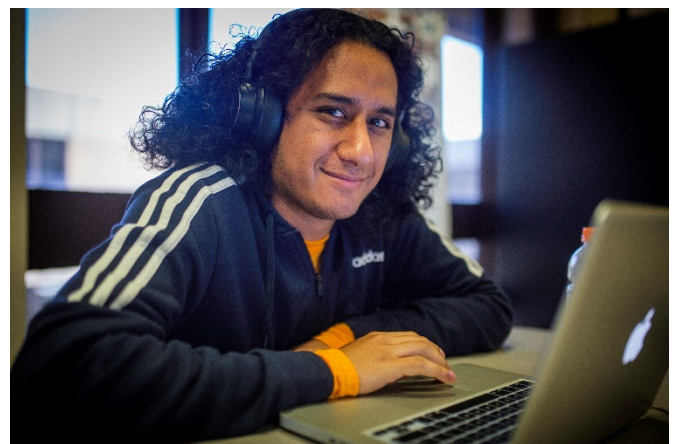

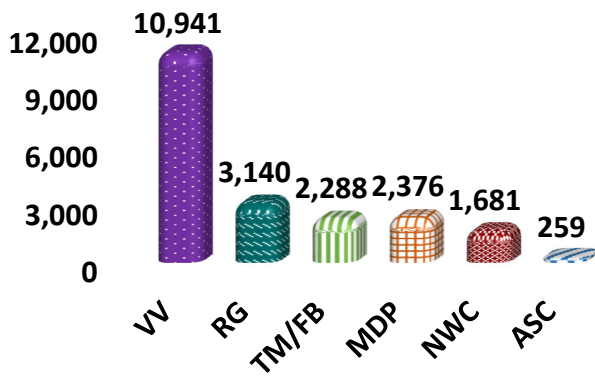

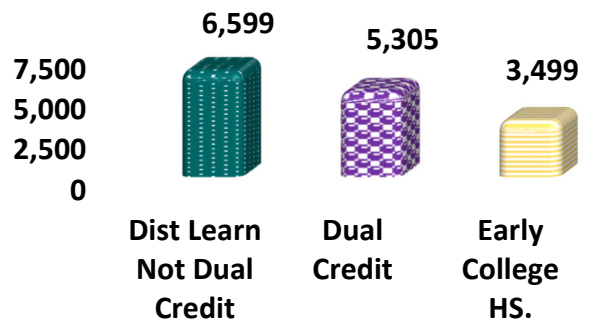

Enrollment of Students at Each Location, Fall 2019

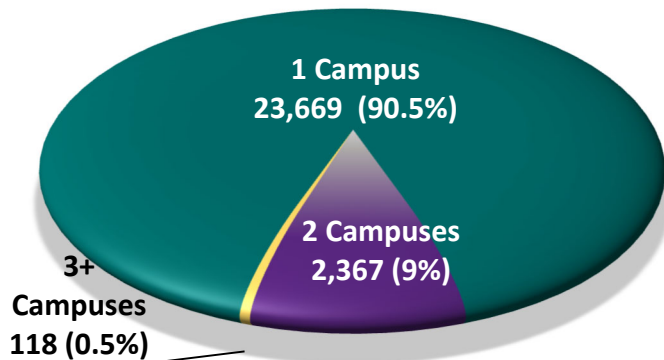


Dual Credit, Early College H.S., and Distance Learning Enrollments, Fall 2019

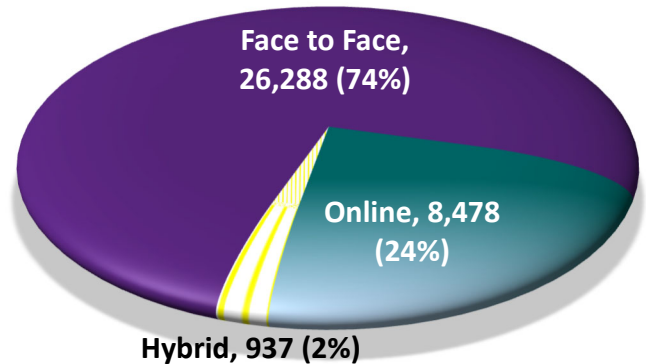

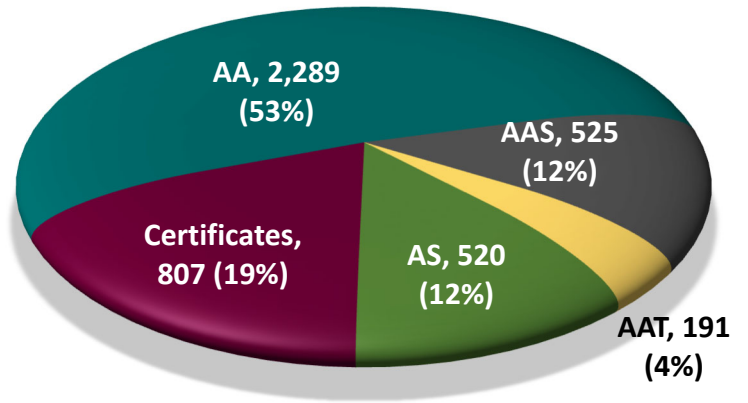

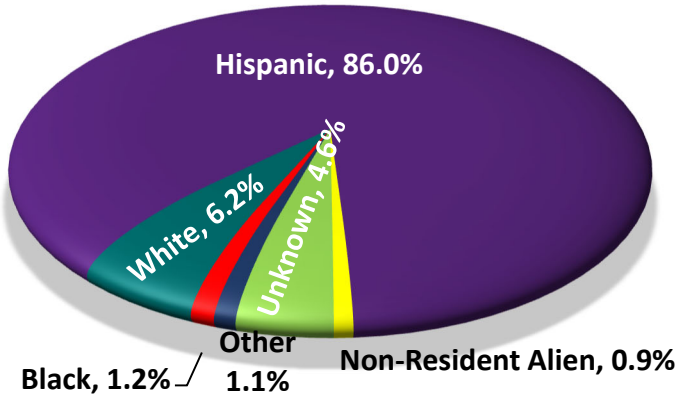

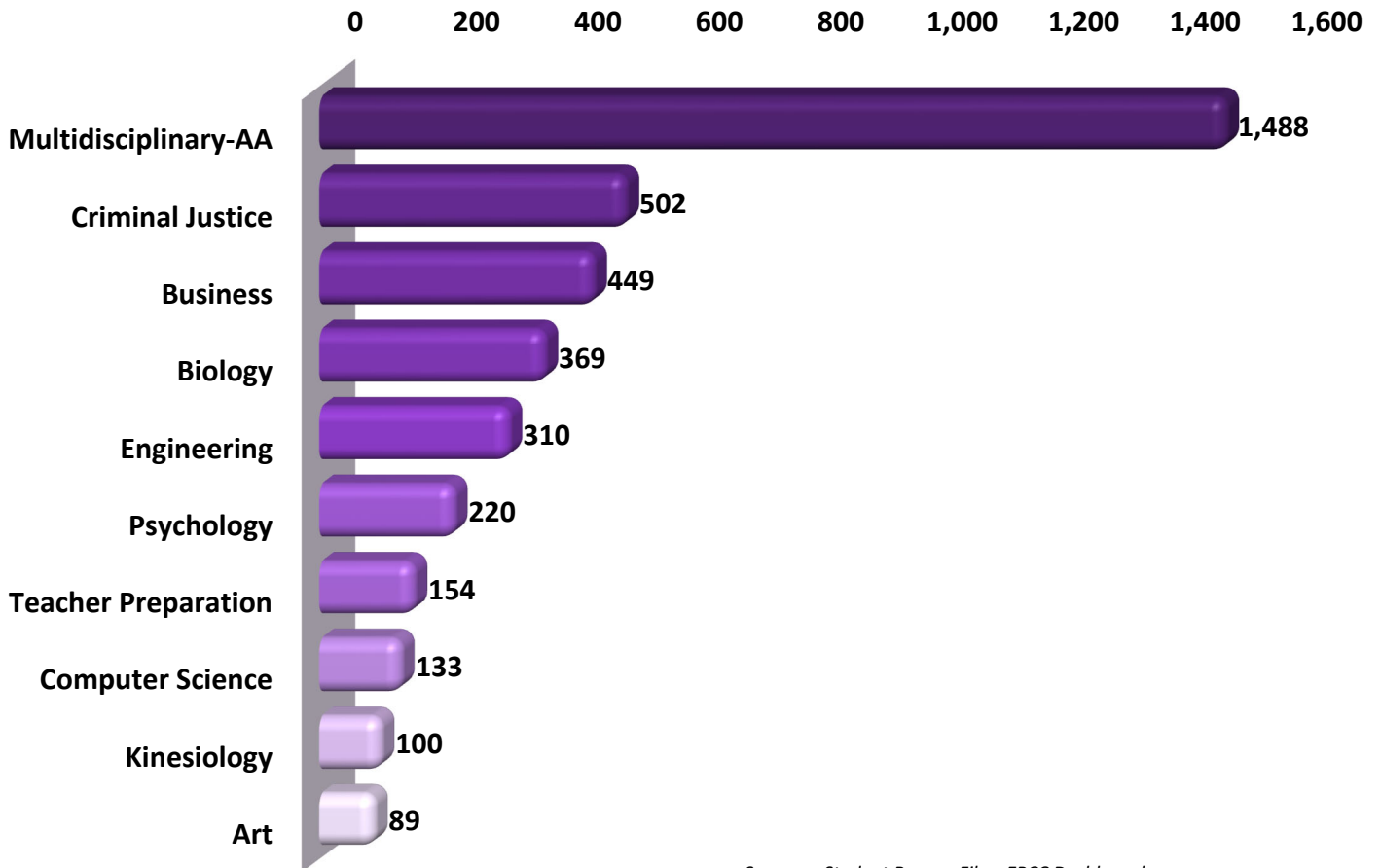

Top 10 Majors of First-Time in College Students, Fall 2019



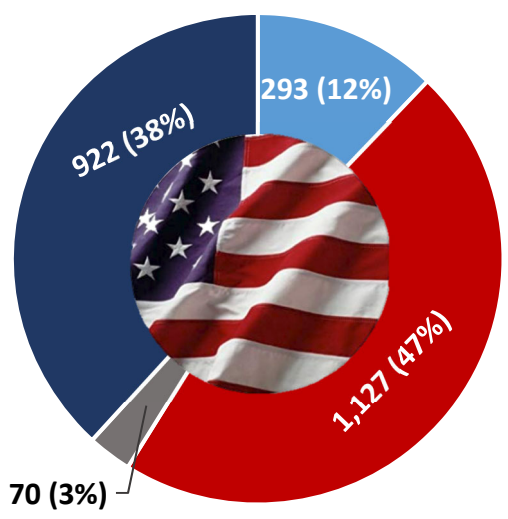

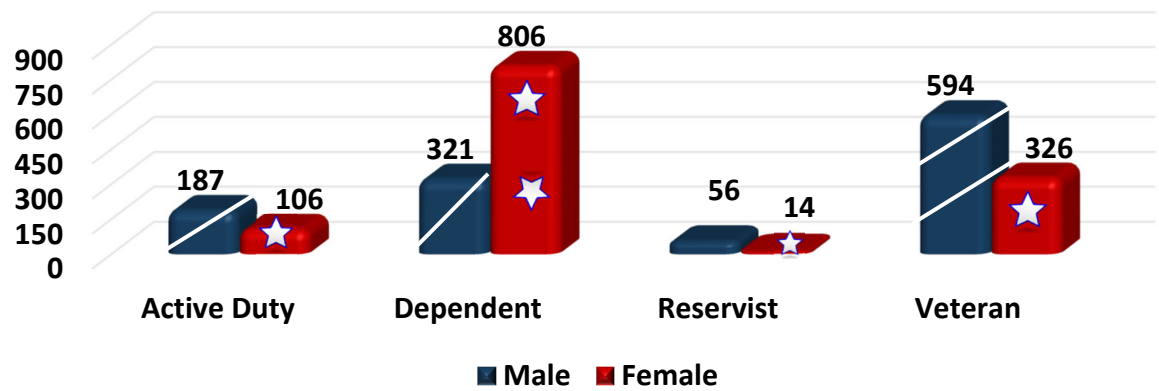
Military Affiliated Student Enrollment, Fall 2019



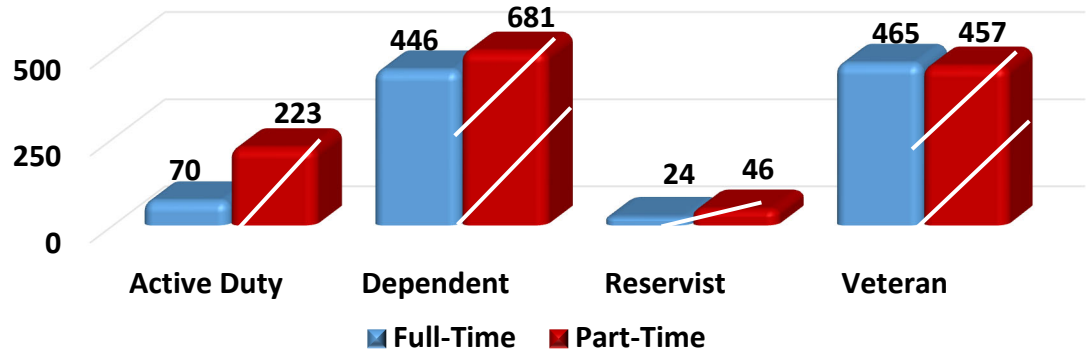

Enrollment of Military Affiliated Students, by Gender, Fall 2019



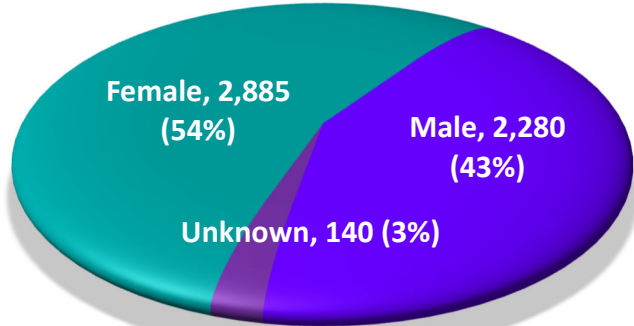
Enrollment of Military Affiliated Students by Full and Part-Time Status, Fall 2019



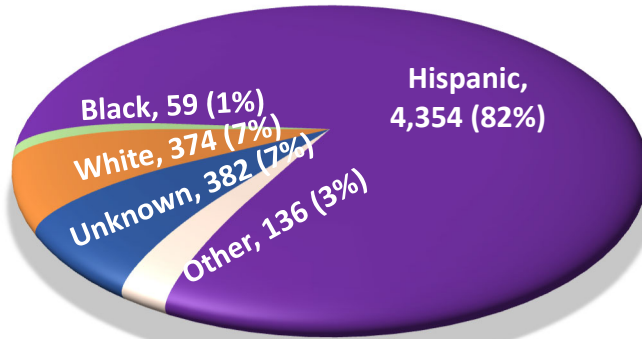

Dual Credit Enrollment by Ethnicity, Fall 2019

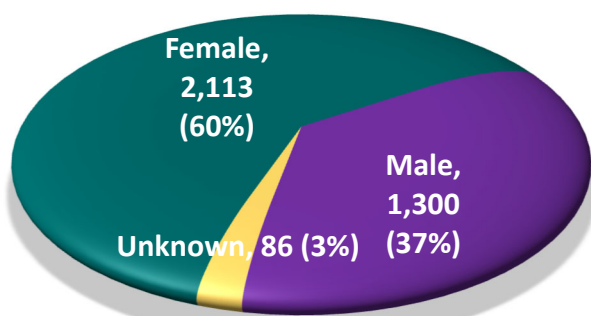

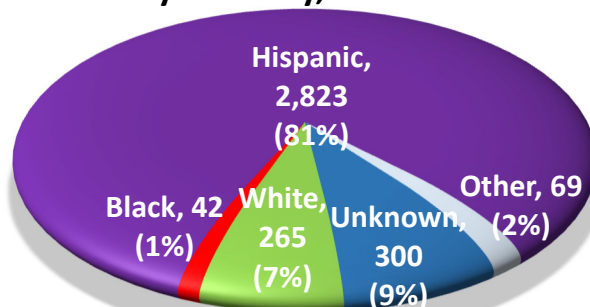

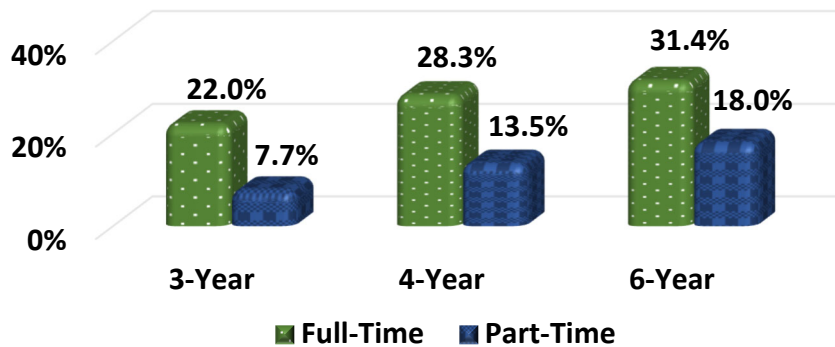

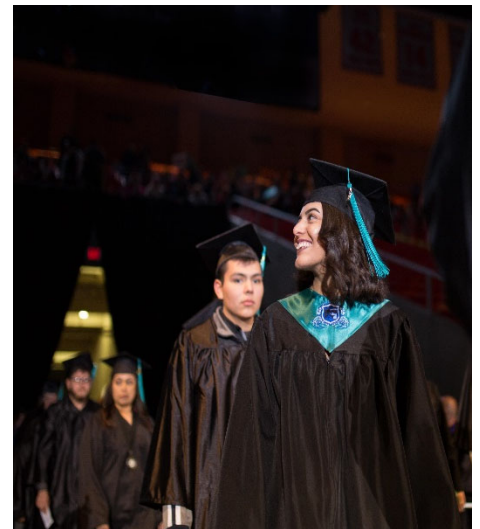

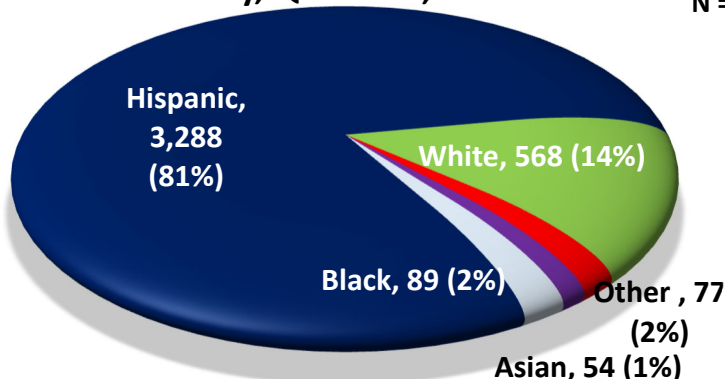

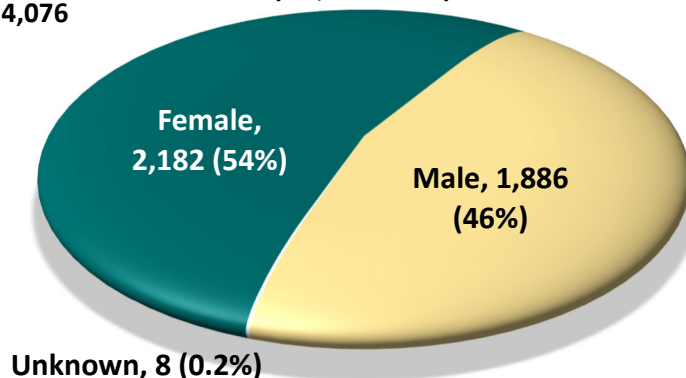

Continuing Education Enrollment by Ethnicity, Quarter 1, Fall 2019

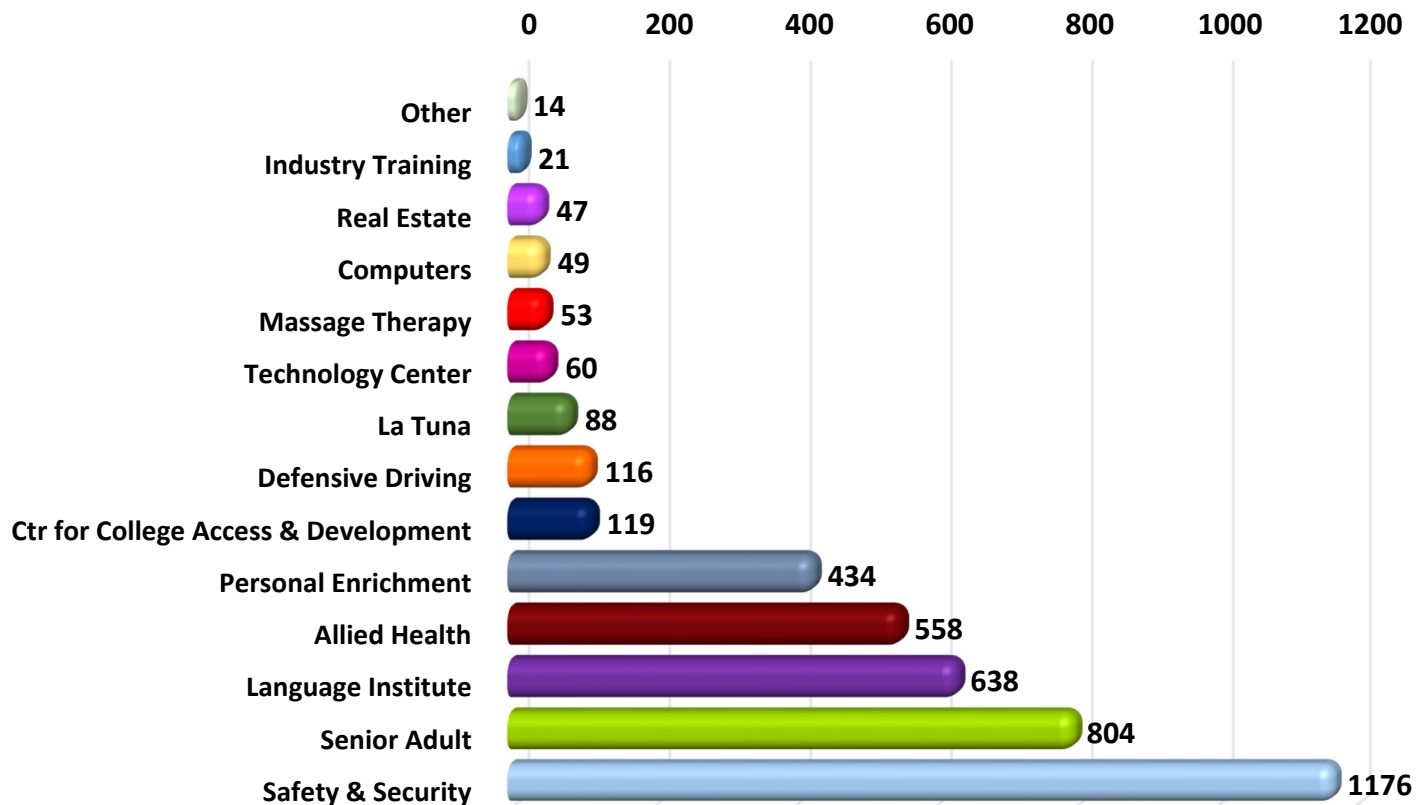


Continuing Education Enrollment by Gender, Quarter 1, Fall 2019

GLOSSARY

Cohort: A group of individuals who meet a set of criteria (e.g., a group of students who register during the same semester or begin attending college for the first time at the same time).

Developmental Student: A student who takes a developmental course during his or her first semester in college (State definition). This designation is permanent with respect to the student's State record.

Face-to-Face Course: The traditional delivery method in which a course is taught in a face-to-face setting with an instructor.

Fall-to-Fall Retention: The percentage or number of students who register in the fall semester during a specified period of time and who register again the following fall semester.

Fall-to-Spring Persistence: The percentage or number of students who register in the fall semester during a specified period of time and who register again the following spring semester.

First-Time In College (FTIC) Student: A student in his or her first semester of college attendance, who has never attended any college previously.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE): The total number of student credit hours divided by 15 for the Fall term (or for one semester only) and is divided by 30 for the entire academic or fiscal year.

Full-Time Student: Any student who is registered for 12 or more credit hours during any semester.

Internet Course: A type of delivery method in which a course is taught online and allows students access to course materials 24 hours a day. Faculty post materials, instructions, readings and assignments online for students to complete on their own or in a group.

Part-Time Student: Any student who is registered for 11 credit hours or less during any semester.

Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB): This agency was created by the Texas Legislature and provides leadership and coordination for the Texas higher education system and works with the legislature, governor, governing boards, higher education institutions and other entities to help promote access to quality higher education across Texas.

Unduplicated Enrollment: The number of students registered during a specified period of time.

V2019: aka Vintage Year 2019. The final year of data produced in a time series of estimates of population that begins with the most recent decennial U.S. Census data and extends to the "Vintage Year." V2019 is the most current year of population estimates available as of July 1, 2020.
